Linking your home group

Are you a new group?

Once an AA group has established its basic structure and format, an important next step is registering with its local General Service Office. GSO connects a group to information from its Area Assembly and local District and can provide guidance to a group as they begin to participate in the General Service Conference structure. Creating this line of communication will allow a group to elect a primary contact; the General Service Representative. The GSR will gather and share information between the home group and GSO by attending General Assemblies and District meetings. Having a known presence and a voice at the Area and/or District level is why the #1 Concept of World Service states, "Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship". We, as active members of A.A., have the privilege to participate in the growth, maintenance, and stability of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Are you an established group?

Has your Delegate come to your home group recently? Are you in contact with other GSRs in other districts as well as your own? Do you know what Box 4-5-9 is? Have you read the Group Handbook? Who in your group could you see as the next GSR? It's easy to fall into a routine of attending District meetings, business meetings, and fulfilling home group responsibilities, that enthusiasm and motivation can run low. There are several easily accessible resources that can be a spring board for your group to be informed and involved. It should be the responsibility of the GSR/Alt GSR but the weight can be carried by everyone in the group. It's important to keep in mind your time of service in this role is limited. Keeping group members informed and encouraging them to know more will strengthen your group consciences and your group's legacy.



The Group Conscience

All throughout A.A. we hear the words "group conscience"...but what is it really? What does it even mean? How does one get formed? And almost more importantly, how does it work? One

definition of a group conscience is that it is the collective conscience of the group members. This definition goes on to say that an informed group conscience implies that pertinent information has been studied and that all views have been heard, before the group votes (Area 57 Document, "Informed Group Conscience"). This suggests just how important it is for a GSR to take information from the District and Area level, and return that information back to the group, thus allowing the



group to become informed. Once this information is returned to the group, major and minority opinions are heard, and a vote is taken, and the substantial unanimity of the group then becomes a part of the "group conscience". It is also important to remem-

ber that just as in our individual recoveries, sometimes the "best" decision isn't always the "right" one. But in all cases, the group conscience is always good, when it is informed. In one of Bill's writings in the Grapevine (found in Language of the Heart) on Tradition Two, he states "the group conscience will, in the end, prove a far more infallible guide for group affairs than the decision of any individual member, however good or wise he may be. This is a striking and almost unbelievable fact about Alcoholics Anonymous."
