
The Annual General Service Conference

Toward the end Dr. Bob's life and as Bill W. grew older, it became apparent that Alcoholics Anonymous would need to replace its leadership of "old-timers" with some kind of leadership structure independent of specific individuals.

In the late 1940's, Bill and Bob began to develop the General Service Conference of A.A. with the blessing of the trustees. As we have discussed before, the word "conference" refers both to the structure of our organization as well as the weeklong event which takes place in April each year.

Bill got to work developing the structure the Conference which would eventually be authorized to act for Alcoholics Anonymous in 1955.

The first General Service Conference (gathering) was held in 1951 in New York City as a chance for delegates



from across the country to visit our General Service Office and examine the services it provided and the funding which supported it. Bill's "A.A.'s Legacy of Service" can be found in Appendix A of The A.A. Service manual and is a great brief record of A.A.'s history from its beginning to 1951



Many members are attracted to the controversial topics of making changes to our literature, but agenda items cover many topics which affect A.A. as a whole.

An agenda item can come from any AA member but it I usually an issue which has been discussed by a district or area and submitted to the General Service Board for review.



The delegate then passed this agenda along to the membership through the GSR.

Preparing your group for the General Service Conference

The group conscience benefits from members who are informed. You may want to start with the "73rd **GSC Summary 2.24.23"** Word Document. This document contains the background material on each agenda item including who submitted the item and why, as well as information pertaining to the item itself.

Our delegate and the alternate delegate have put a great deal of time and examination into selecting a few of the agenda items they feel are likely to make it to the floor for a vote at the conference. These items are designated by this icon:

Please feel free to divide items up among group members and have each willing member present a summary to the group for vote. Or your group may choose just one item and dig into the background material as a group. For example, if the agenda item refers to a pamphlet, please read the pamphlet for clarification.

Any way your group chooses to participate is welcomed. The more informed voices our delegate collects, the more her decision will represent our area when she reaches the Conference to vote.
