I am grateful to AA for giving my life meaning again, when before my purpose in life was how, when, and where I was going to get my next drink. It was sug-

that and has been largely responsible for the maintenance of my sobriety. I was and still am so grateful to be sober that I seek to tell others about this program. Thus, my interest in public information.

I've been privileged to serve as Area 50's Public Information Chairperson for the past two years. Our PI Committee meets virtually every second Wednesday of each month and consists of 4-6 active members. During this time, our members have been manning AA literature tables at various colleges and health fairs in the area. We are currently reaching out to high schools and elementary schools to place AA literature in their health and guidance offices and continue to distribute literature to other agencies as well. As our PI activities will be expanding, we will require more manpower to accomplish our goals. In this regard, we have been soliciting support from home groups to assist in these efforts.

The PI Committee has engaged in digital outreach on the internet for several months this past spring. There was positive feedback as a result of this form

of outreach. Unfortunately, these efforts were halted due to recent NYS advertising regulations regarding addiction. However, I believe this venture could be revisited in the future.

> A continuing effort is the airing of AA public service announcements date, there are about 6 stations

that either read a live AA script or utilize one of the audio PSA (public service announcement) recordings posted in the aa.org's Media Library.

Another effort our committee has been engaged in is having "bus tails" posted on the rear of NFTA buses in the Buffalo area. This campaign has been running daily since September 5th and will run through December 25th. Other outreach modalities we have used are public service announcements in newspapers, on billboards, and in Buffalo's metro rail system.

In closing, if our efforts result in even one person getting sober, then everything we are doing is worth it.
