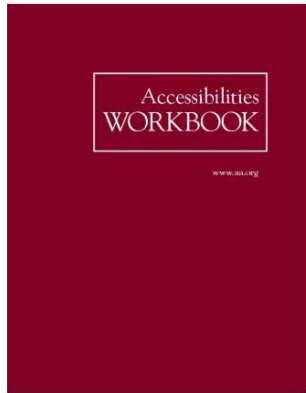

A.A. Guidelines are compiled from the shared experience of A.A. members in various service areas. They also reflect guidance given through the Twelve Traditions and the General Service Conference (GSC) and Councils in keeping with our Tradition of autonomy, respect to members affecting other groups of A.A., as a whole, most decisions are made by the group conscience of the members involved. The purpose of these Guidelines is to assist in creating an informed group conscience.

### HOW A.A. CARRY THE MESSAGE TO ALCOHOLICS IN CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

The material in these Guidelines has come from the experience and growth of A.A. members and facilitators in various correctional facilities. We are privileged to share it with A.A.s throughout the United States and Canada who are carrying our message behind the walls. Additional information is available in the Corrections section of GSA's website at [www.aa.org](http://www.aa.org) or you can contact GSA's Corrections Desk (corrections@aa.org).

### PURPOSE

The purpose of a corrections committee is to coordinate the work of individual A.A. members and groups who are interested in carrying our message of recovery to alcoholics behind the walls, and to act as a means of ensuring the way from the facility to the larger A.A. community through assistance contacts.

A corrections committee may function within the structure of a General Service Conference area committee or an independent local office. As A.A. has grown, it is common that a committee formed within the A.A. service structure would have members from an individual member or group.

### HOW TO GET STARTED

Perhaps the first step would be to contact your local area committee and, if there is no existing Corrections Committee, they will connect you to the Corrections Committee, Local A.A. Council and National Office. Also have the opportunity to participate in corrections health days work or attend a corrections group representative. It is good to have a good idea of how members from many groups serve in the corrections. If a corrections committee does intend to form itself, there are many ways to form one. Thus, a chairman is needed, and place are needed for all and individual facility group will be needed and A.A. help. The corrections chairman often participates with the area, district or regional committee. The chairman also receives information from the Corrections Committee on Corrections, and usually at the General Service Conference and other Conferences. Meetings and members on A.A. in corrections settings work.

If you are a new committee, please list your corrections committee with the General Service Office in New York by completing GSA's Corrections Desk correspondence or through experience. Your discussion will be put in a meeting and receive a Corrections Handbook and other service materials.

The Corrections Handbook is a good basic text. It contains information on how to form a corrections committee, background information, goals, history, and a selection of pamphlets, letters, etc., and may provide some ideas of how to get started in the area.

The Corrections page on the GSA website also provides other service materials, including the newsletter "Behind the Walls," which, and members and correspondents there.

### RELATIONSHIP TO A.A. IN THE AREA OR DISTRICT

A corrections committee shares with local meetings about the corrections services available available to carry our message to alcoholics behind the walls, who help with the meetings from a healthy and the long of A.A. history. They are also the point of contact for any questions and concerns about Twelve Step work at a corrections facility. Some individual groups have a corrections representative who attends the committee meetings. Corrections committees coordinate special events or corrections workshops for inmates or participate in A.A. meetings including those in cooperation in cooperation with the local or state facilities, correspondence and provide contacts, including literature requests, and information about displaying an A.A. meeting in a facility as a facility.

As in all A.A. activity, communications of needs and progress in regional, Corrections committees usually attend other as an individual committee or before or after a local district or area committee, on a regular basis, in a quarterly basis. The corrections also participate in area and district meetings where they can represent shared experience and communications needs, and they become members. The National Committee on Corrections has requested that most members would be linked through shared experience.

### FUNCTIONS OF CORRECTIONS COMMITTEES

The basic functions of corrections committees are described in the Corrections Handbook. However, there are a number of ways that corrections committees, which attend to do so, have A.A. meetings in the area and district meetings where they can represent shared experience and communications needs, and they become members. The National Committee on Corrections has requested that most members would be linked through shared experience.

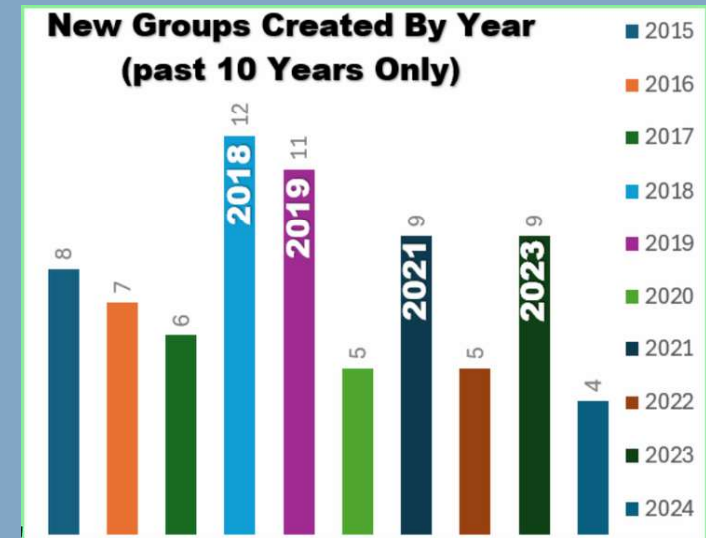
